Knowledge and research-based educational opportunities for Extension, Sea Grant, and other key stakeholders such as land-owners, public officials, and industry leaders.

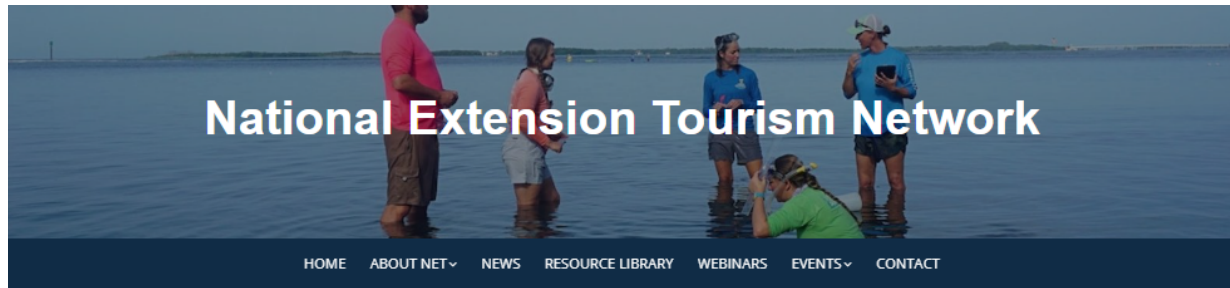
2 Taking an Inventory

Who are you?

The Origins of Cooperative Extension

The Morrill Act of 1862

Called on states to set aside and sell up to 30,000 acres of land and use the funds to establish colleges, hence the name “land grant” universities

The Hatch Act of 1887

Provided funding for agricultural research programs at state land-grant agricultural experiment stations in all 50 states

The Smith Lever Act of 1914

Created a Cooperative Extension Service associated with each land-grant institution. This partnership between agricultural colleges and USDA enables the dissemination of information produced by the experiment stations' research

The result of these three key pieces of legislation is a Cooperative Extension Service that brings the wealth of knowledge generated and housed by the Universities out to the communities in the form of research, teaching and service programs and initiatives

3. Family & Community Development (formerly family consumer science – farmer's wives)

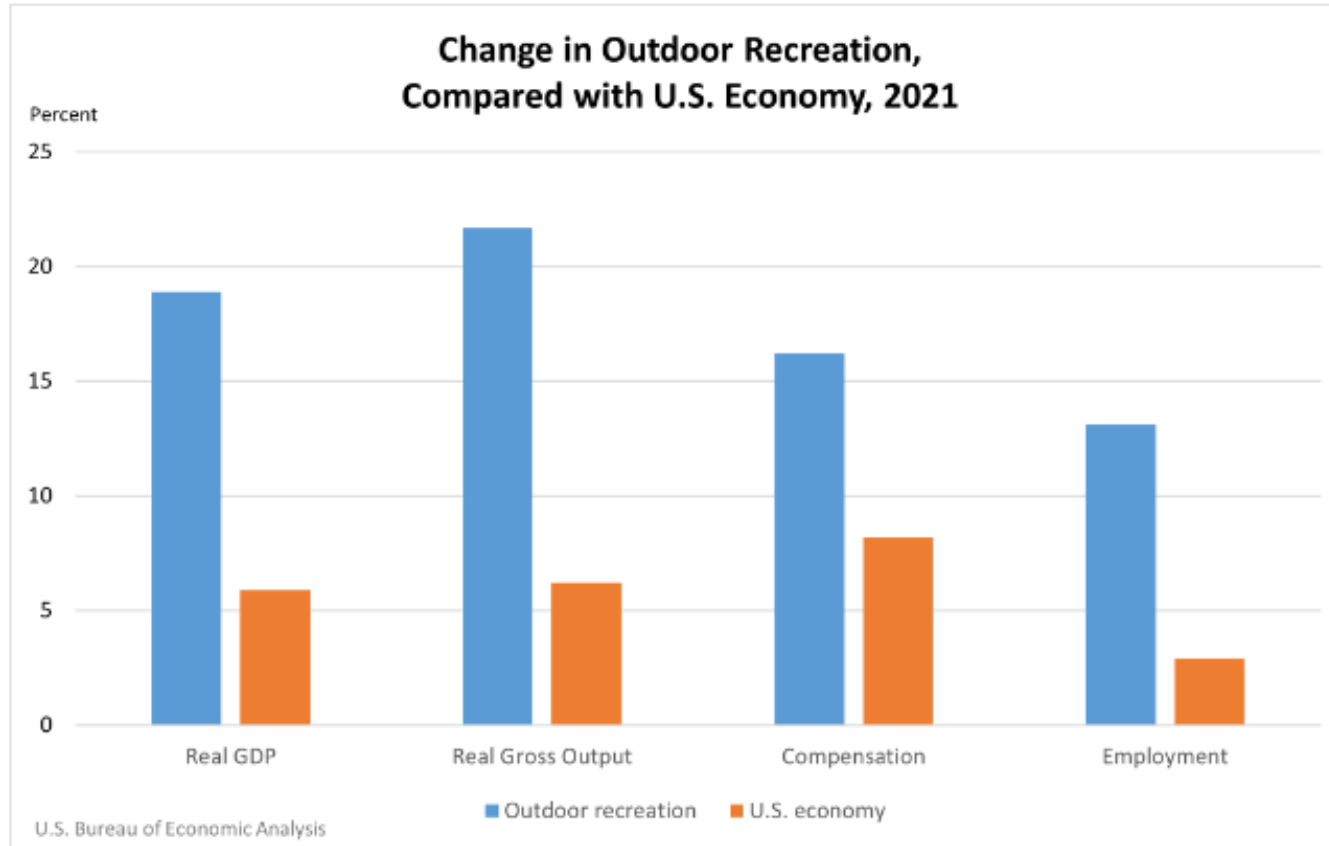

Inflation-adjusted ("real") GDP for the outdoor recreation economy increased 18.9 percent in 2021, compared with a 5.9 percent increase for the overall U.S. economy, reflecting a rebound in outdoor recreation after the decrease of 21.6 percent in 2020. Real gross output for the outdoor recreation economy increased 21.7 percent, while outdoor recreation compensation increased 16.2 percent and employment increased 13.1 percent.

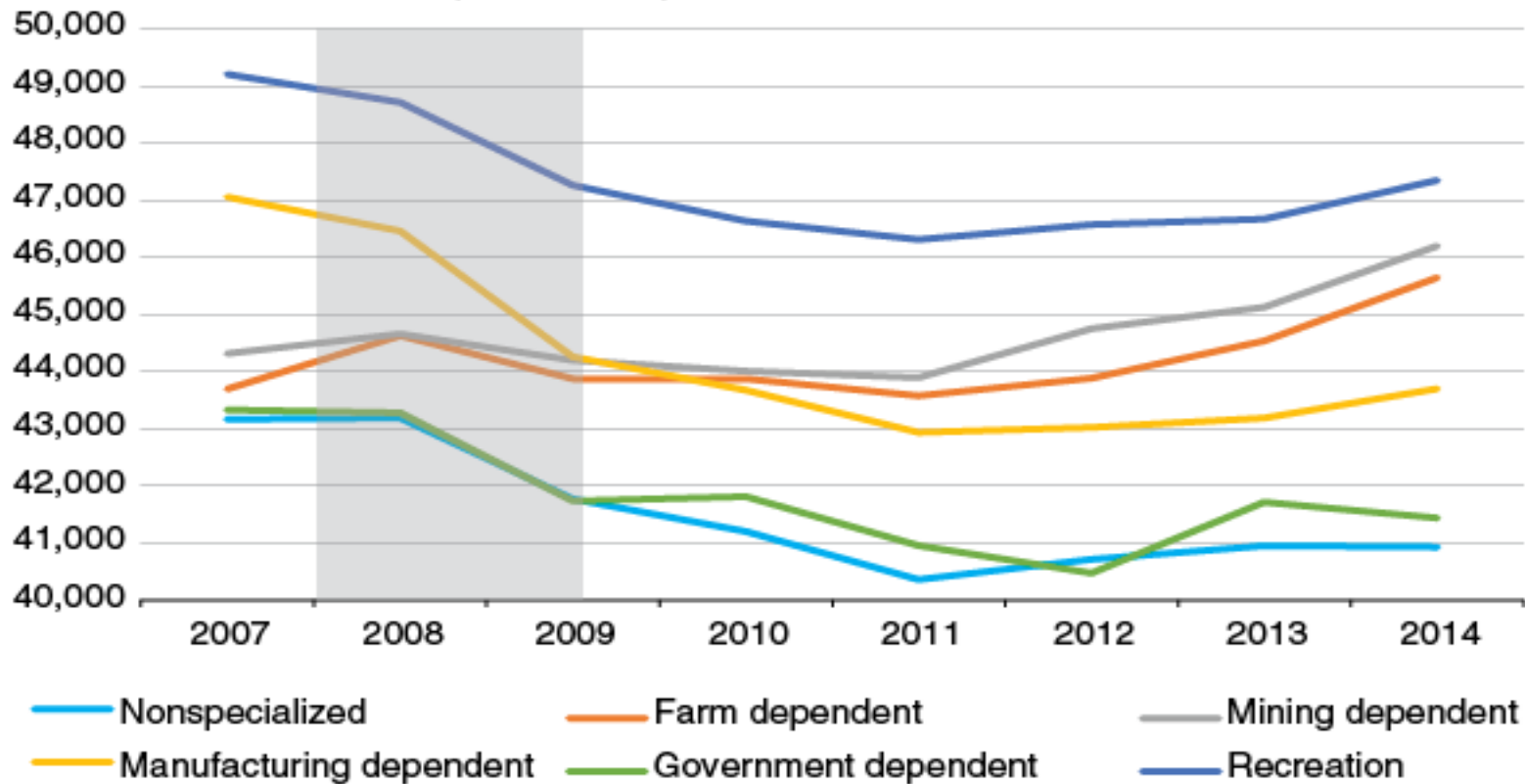


In 2021 the outdoor recreation economy accounted for **1.9 percent** (\$454.0 billion) of GDP

vs. **0.7 percent** (\$164.7 billion) for farms

Rural median household incomes were highest in recreation counties

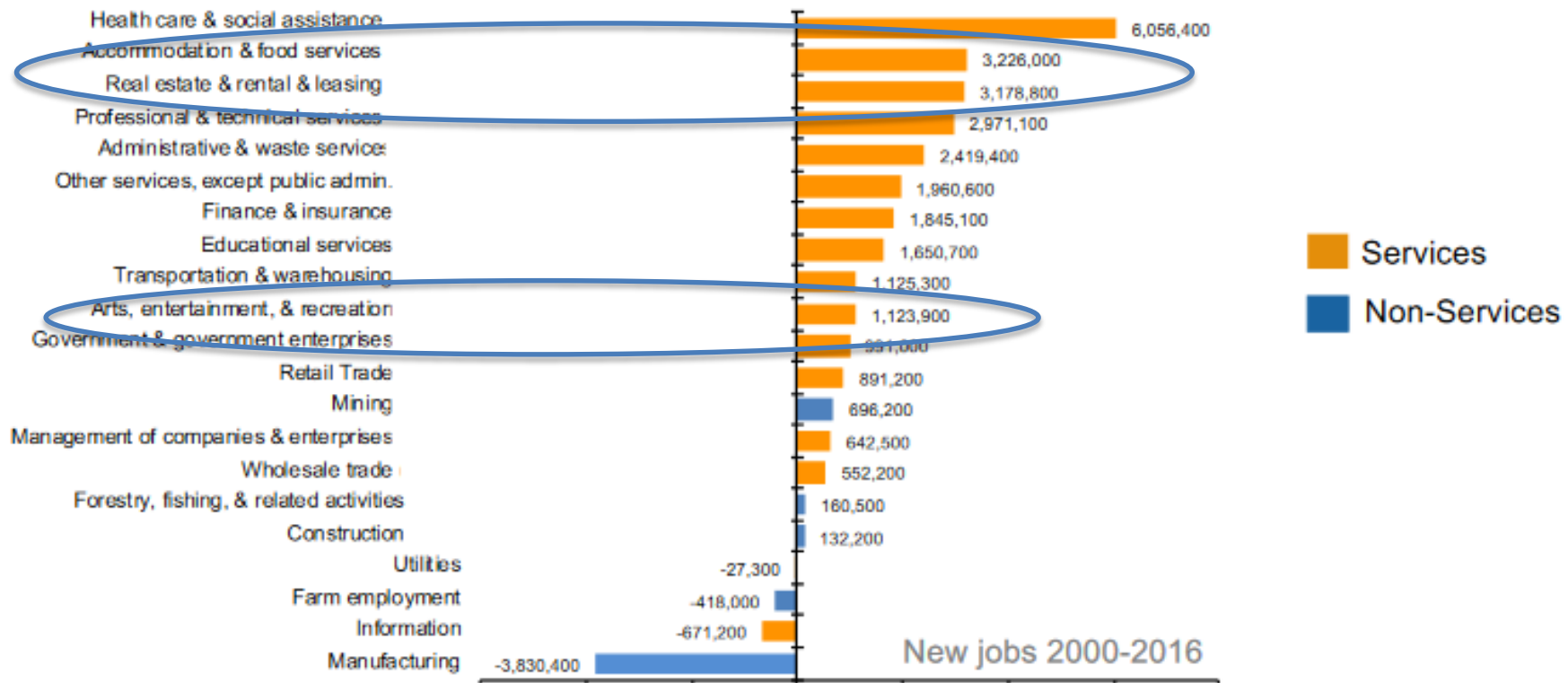
Median household income (2014 dollars)

OUTDOOR PARTICIPATION SNAPSHOT

KEY FINDINGS

Since the COVID-19 pandemic was declared in March of 2020, the number of new and returning (lapsed) outdoor participants has increased 26%.

The growth in new participants and returning participants in 2021 was the highest ever recorded.

There was a reasonable expectation that during 2021, the second year of the pandemic, outdoor participation would return to 2019 levels as indoor activity including, dining, sporting events, and fitness centers and gyms, reopened.

The 2021 data indicates that participation in outdoor recreation retained momentum in 2021. This data indicates that outdoor recreation is "sticky;" once someone begins to participate, they are likely to continue to participate.

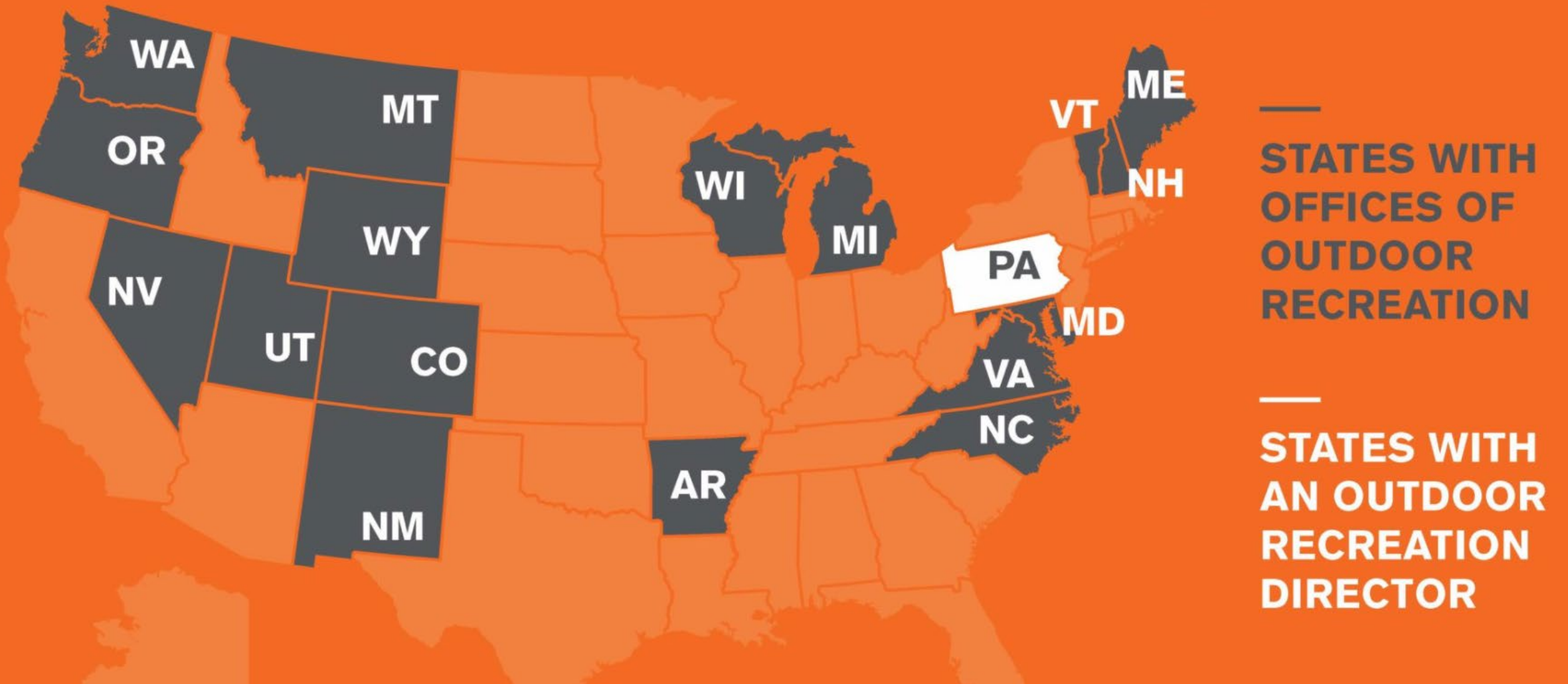


Crowds, Trash, Overrun the Eastern Sierra, CA

During the summer months, large amounts of visitors descend upon the region, and this summer tourist season is pushing the region to its **breaking point**. More and more people are traveling closer to home with travel restrictions in place due to the ongoing Coronavirus pandemic. With Southern California a 5-hour drive away, and the San Francisco Bay Area having access via mountain passes during the summer months, the Eastern Sierra is being overrun.

As part of the President’s America the Beautiful Initiative, the Biden-Harris Administration launched an interagency effort, called the [Federal Interagency Council on Outdoor Recreation \(FICOR\)](#), that will work to create more safe, affordable, and equitable opportunities for Americans to get outdoors.

The FICOR – which includes leaders from the Departments of the Interior, Agriculture, Commerce, and Defense – will focus on improving access to nature, expanding outdoor recreation opportunities, and providing the public with improved and more affordable experiences on America’s public lands and waters.

USDA to Create Plan to Expand Recreation Economies and Help People Thrive Across Rural America

Rural Development, National Institute of Food and Agriculture, and U.S. Forest Service Partner to Create New Tools and Resources

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19, 2023 – The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) today announced that it will create a plan to expand recreation economies to help people thrive across rural America.

Through a [Memorandum of Understanding](#), [USDA Rural Development](#), the [National Institute of Food and Agriculture \(NIFA\)](#) and the [U.S. Forest Service](#) will partner to develop an annual plan to expand economic opportunities related to recreation in communities surrounding America's national forests.

The annual plan will outline the ways the agencies will partner to conduct program outreach, host informational sessions and workshops, and develop toolkits to help people access the resources they need to thrive in recreation economies. The agencies will also:

- Provide technical and planning assistance to help local, state and Tribal leaders develop regional economic development plans that advance recreation economies.
- Provide funding under Rural Development and National Institute of Food and Agriculture programs to help U.S. Forest Service gateway communities expand resilient recreation infrastructure and business development projects that create jobs.
- Develop and maintain strategic partnerships, and more.

Extension's Role in Economic Development and Sustainable Tourism

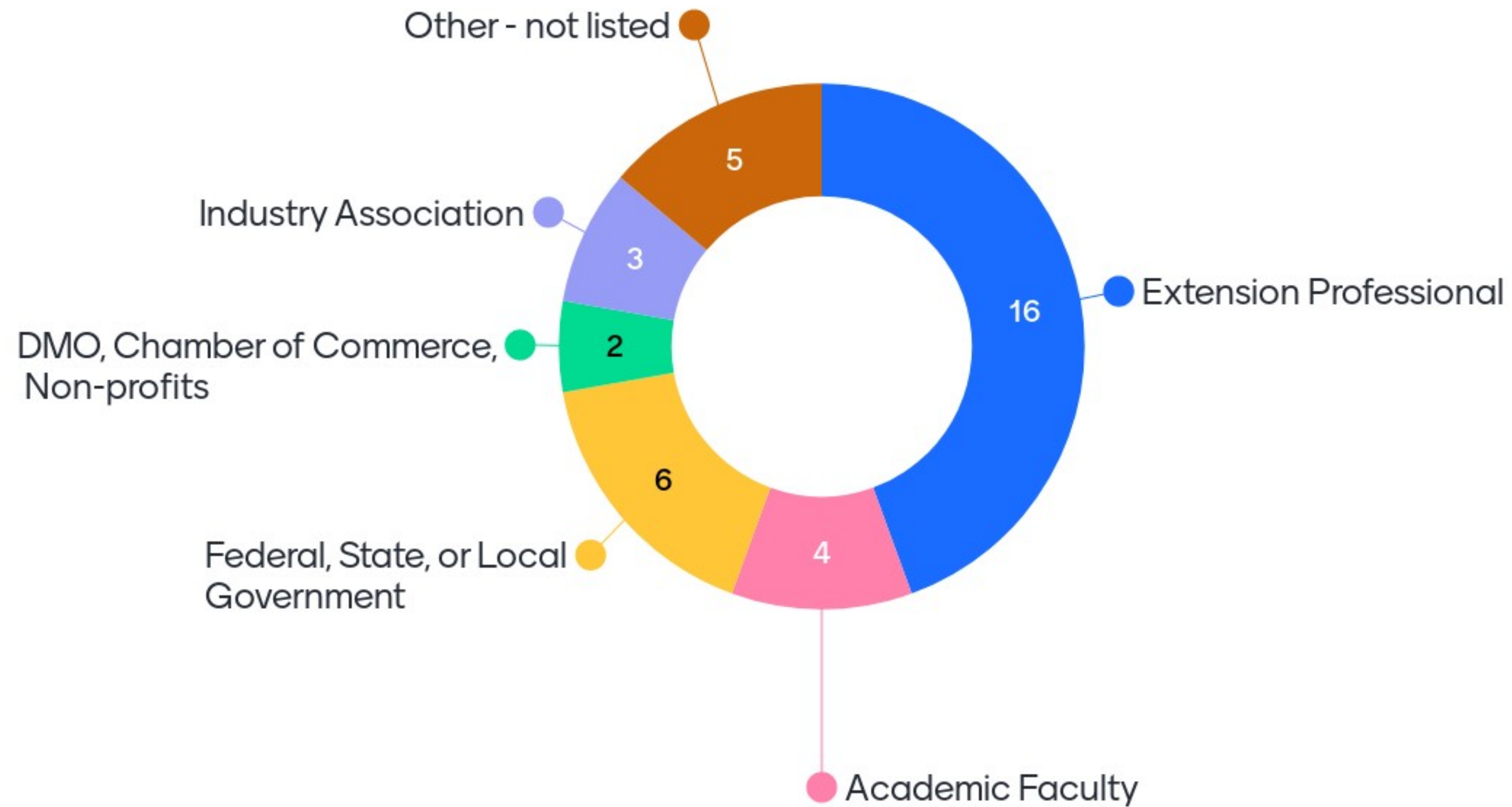
